


The Children


Race of Children




Ethnic Origin of Children

Holiday Ask: The Holiday Ask raised \$19,029.



The Volunteers

CASA worked with 83 volunteers appointed to 157 children during the year. Volunteers donated a total of 4,529 case-related hours valued at \$133,560. They also drove 17,854 miles to visit children and gather information about them.

A Child's Story



Robert entered the DCPP system shortly before his 18th birthday. His mother was locking him in the house, preventing him from attending school or working. Robert was moved in with his older sister after he left his mother's home. CASA got assigned to the child at the beginning of his case.

Robert expressed interest in technical training, welding specifically. CASA accompanied the youth to a welding training program twice, once for an interview and then for a meeting about financial aid. CASA and the Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCPP) helped put the petition together for financial aid and Robert enrolled. CASA also helped Robert and his sister manage and, in some cases, reduce their bills, as they were struggling to pay everything in full, on time.

Eventually Robert became more self-efficient and responsible and moved out from his sister's apartment and rented a small place on his own. Robert still has more to learn, but with his CASA's help he accomplished a lot
